**IMPORTANT INFORMATION**  
**REGARDING SPECIAL JURY TRIALS**

**What type of trial have I been summoned for?**

You have been summoned to take part in the jury pre-selection process for a trial referred to as a “special.” A “special” trial involves matters (criminal or civil) that cannot be resolved in the time frame of a regular petit trial. A special trial can last three weeks or longer. You may have noticed that there is a reporting date, but no ending date on your summons. Due to the nature of the trial, we are not able to provide you specific information regarding the actual case or provide an ending date. The judge presiding over the case will provide more information to you, if you are selected to continue with the pre-selection process. You are not a juror at this time. You are in the first stages of the jury pre-selection process.

**What is the first thing I am required to do?**

A red and white Juror Qualification Questionnaire is in your packet. Please fill out the questionnaire and return it to the Jury Office within ten days. The Jury Office will then enter your information into the database, and will refer to this information to respond to any inquiries you have regarding jury duty, or requests to be excused or deferred from jury service. We are severely limited in our ability to assist you if we do not have updated information in our system.

**How will I know what time and which days to report for jury service?**

A reporting time will NOT be printed on your summons. This Court uses an automated telephone system to schedule jurors. The automated telephone system will not work for you unless you have returned your questionnaire, and it has been entered into the database. You must not call the automated phone system until after 5:00 p.m. on the evening before your first reporting date. The automated phone system number is 354-3518. The automated system will ask you to punch in the **nine digit number located just above your name and address on your summons.** (If you do not have a touch tone telephone, please call the jury office at 354-3090 for instructions at 8:00 a.m., the next business day.) If you are required to report, the message will list your reporting time. If you are not required to report, the recording will instruct you to call again at a specified time.

**IT IS POSSIBLE THAT YOU WILL NOT BE REQUIRED TO REPORT ON YOUR FIRST DAY OF JURY DUTY.** Therefore it is very important that you call the automated phone system the evening before your first reporting date, after 5 p.m. for instructions. You must call the recorded message every evening beginning the evening before your reporting date. You will be required to call the automated phone system until the recorded message indicates that your service is over. It normally takes five to ten days for a jury to be selected for a special trial; therefore, plan on calling the recording for at least a two week period to receive instructions. If you report to the Court in error, the Court will not pay you or give you credit for that day’s attendance. Information is not available to jurors until after 5:00 p.m., therefore, please do not call the recording before 5:00 p.m.

### **How can I request to be deferred or excused from jury service?**

The judge presiding over a special trial will review all requests to be excused or deferred, and ultimately decides if you may be excused or deferred. It is very important that you submit any excuse/deferral requests as soon as possible, to allow proper time for processing and review. After you have completed the questionnaire, you may request to be deferred or excused in the remarks section on the back of your questionnaire, or you may submit a letter WITH your questionnaire. Please be as detailed as possible regarding deferral or excuse requests. If you request a deferral or excuse, you may call the automated phone system (354-3518) beginning ten days prior to the reporting date on your summons. Punch in your nine-digit number to verify if your request has been granted.

### **How was I selected to participate in the pre-selection process for a special jury trial?**

A computer draws juror names at random from a combined voter registration, driver's (and non-driver's) license, and D.C. tax forms list. If you have served as a juror in D.C. Superior Court, you can still be called for jury duty by the U.S. District Court. Once you have served as a juror in the U.S. District Court, you will not be required to serve again in the U.S. District Court for at least two years.

### **How do I get to the U.S. District Court located at the E. Barrett Prettyman Courthouse?**

The U.S. District Court is located at 333 Constitution Avenue, NW. We encourage you to use public transportation because metered parking is often difficult to find near the courthouse. The Metro stop at Judiciary Square (located on the Red Line) is only a few blocks from the courthouse.

### **Will I be compensated for jury duty?**

Checks with attendance listed on the stub will be mailed three weeks after your term of service. **Non-government jurors are paid \$40.00 per day of service. Jurors who are employed by either the Federal or D.C. Government will continue to receive their regular paychecks. All jurors will receive transportation allowance of \$4.00 per day. Employers may call the jury office for verification of service at 354-3090.**

### **What are the procedures for inclement weather?**

In the event of inclement weather conditions, jurors may call 354-3000 (main number to the courthouse) to receive information about whether the courthouse will be open or closed.

### **On the days I am not asked to report for jury duty, should I return to work?**

Yes. The Court can only pay you or give you credit for the days that you are required at the courthouse. On all days when your attendance is not required, you should report to your regular job. Your check will have a stub reflecting the days you reported. We suggest that you retain or make copies of your stub as proof of service.

### **Should I telephone the recorded message when serving on a trial?**

No. After you have been selected to serve on a particular trial, you should follow the instructions of the trial judge about days and times of attendance. When the trial for which you are serving is completed, you should contact the jury office. In case of an emergency, you should call the jury office at 354-3090.

### **How many hours will I be at the courthouse each day?**

The number of hours you spend at the courthouse will vary each day that you are here. Reporting time varies when you are on an actual trial, but normally the judge will ask you to report at either 9:00 or 10:00 am. Lunch is usually at 12 p.m. You will be dismissed for the day by the judge, and the dismissal time is normally 5:00 pm. Please note, the judge will set your arrival, lunch, and departure times. Be sure to be on time both in the morning, and after lunch. This is particularly important when serving on a trial since the entire trial proceeding can be delayed because of the tardiness of one juror.

**What types of amenities are available at the Courthouse?**

- Jury Lounge Facilities:** The jury lounge has restrooms, telephones, television sets, reading materials, vending machines, microwave oven and refrigerator.
- Food Service:** The courthouse has a full service cafeteria that is open from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.
- Health Unit:** The Health Unit is located on the first floor in Room 1612.

**What should I wear to court?**

Appropriate dress is required. The courtrooms are generally very cool, you may want to bring a sweater or jacket.

**What is the difference between the U.S. District Court and the D.C. Superior Court?**

The U.S. District Court is a Federal court that has jurisdiction over cases arising under Federal law, or when the U.S. government is a party, while the D.C. Superior Court is the court of local jurisdiction.
